Ben is visiting CHI at Connolly to have a blood test




Having a blood test means that the phlebotomist will take a small amount of blood from Ben's arm or hand. His body is very clever and will make more blood very quickly.

This story will tell you these steps and what happens when Ben came in for his blood test.


Time to Check - In!

The phlebotomist will help you get Ben's arm ready.



The phlebotomist puts a band around Ben's arm. This makes it easier to get blood. The band feels a bit tight but it doesn't hurt.

The phlebotomist will wipe his skin. He needs to hold his arm steady. Ben tries his best to stay still.



The phlebotomist uses the butterfly to take a little bit of blood from Ben's arm.

This feels like a little pinch on his skin.

It is important for him to try and stay still. Ben can play with his favourite toy or look at his favourite toy or device which helps him.



The butterfly is taken away.




The phlebotomist puts a plaster on Ben's arm.
